

NOTARIAL SERVICES

The reason a person needs to visit a Notary is to prepare or certify a document that can then be used in another country in a form that will be acceptable to the Courts and other authorities in that country.

Notaries work for commercial firms engaged in international trade and for private individuals who have dealings in other countries.

A Notary's responsibilities can be summarised as follows:

- Checking that you are who you claim to be
- Making sure that you have the right authority to sign any documents that require your signature
- Ensuring that you understand the nature of any commitment you are taking on
- Making sure that all the formal requirements are properly carried out.



A better way of doing things legally

A Notary has a very high standard of care which applies not only to the person seeking their services but also to anyone who may rely on the document produced including the Governments or officials of other countries.

A Notary is a lawyer and a member of the oldest legal profession in England and Wales. His is an internationally recognised Public Office. A Notary has passed examinations in the relevant areas of their work, including international law, in addition to their solicitor qualifications. A Notary is appointed by the Archbishop of Canterbury.
